After receiving more than 65,000 views, "Recursive Fury" was retracted by the journal *Frontiers* in 2014 in response to complaints by a small number of readers, not on academic or ethical grounds but based on legal concerns. After its retraction, the paper was posted at this URL by the University of Western Australia for over a year, during which time it attracted 13,000 downloads and no complaints or legal action.
